The course, Research Theories and Methods, 15 higher education credits, is a programme course given within the Master's Programme in Social Work and Human Rights within the Faculty of Social Science. The course is a methodology course.

3. Entry requirements

To be eligible for the course, Research Theories and Methods, 15 higher education credits, a Bachelor's Degree in Social Work, or a Bachelor's Degree in related topics, and proficiency in English is required.

4. Course content

The course deals with the following topics:

- •Scientific perspectives and paradigm shifts from a historical perspective
- •Theoretical concepts concerning both qualitative and quantitative scientific work
- •Formulation of research questions and implementation in research
- •Review of earlier research using digital resources
- •Ethics in social research
- •A variety of qualitative and quantitative research methods

5. Learning outcomes

After completing the course the students shall have

- •achieved profound knowledge and understanding of scientific perspectives and paradigm shifts from a historical perspective
- •achieved a capacity to discuss, analyze, and apply complex theoretical concepts concerning both qualitative and quantitative scientific work in an international context
- •be able to formulate and discuss research questions in an independent and creative manner and implement these in research out of a critical perspective
- •be able to conduct a critical review of earlier research published in scientific journals or reports
- •have gained insight in the role of science, its possibilities and limitations in an international context
- •be able to analyze and discuss ethical issues in conducting research
- •be able to select, understand, and use complex qualitative and statistical methods in social research
- •be able to identify the need of further knowledge in the field of social work.
